Comberton Village College was recognised for being in the top 10% of non-selective schools nationally for student attainment in the 2024 end of KS4 exams.

YEAR 7 AUTHOR TALK



ROBOTICS CLUB

Comberton Village College team secure spot at world's largest youth robotics competition, UK

Team "Bob" from Comberton Village College were crowned with the Innovator award at FIRST Tech Challenge UK's regional qualifying tournament In Birmingham on 12th March 2025, earning themselves a spot at the challenge's UK Championship.

The event saw teams from across the region showcasing their engineering and coding skills as they competed for industry-judged awards that celebrate innovation, design, community outreach and more.

Being crowned Innovators means the team have secured themselves a spot at the UK Championships to represent Cambridge at the London Copper Box Arena in June. They'll go head-to-head against 47 other UK teams. The Innovate Award recognises teams that think imaginatively to bring their designs to life.

Teams put their student-built robots to the test in this year's water-themed challenge, INTO THE DEEP, presented by RTX. During two-anda-half-minute matches, alliances of two teams compete to score points by completing complex tasks using robots programmed for both autonomous and driver-controlled operation. "The teams' incredible creativity, resilience and problemsolving skills truly demonstrate what it takes to succeed in STEM and their futures.





Not only have they risen to the challenge, but they've also reminded us all that teamwork and collaboration are what's needed to tackle tomorrow's biggest challenges.

FIRST Tech Challenge UK empowers young people aged 12-18 with the technical knowledge and soft skills to thrive in STEM and beyond. From September to March, working like teams in industry and often supported by a mentor, they design, build and program a robot to compete at progressive events. Beyond technical skills, the challenge fosters teamwork, problem-solving and resilience, communication, project management, and fundraising.

CAMBRIDGE FESTIVAL FILM SCREENING

They displayed information about the college and eco team's most recent and impressive achievements. Year 9 Healthy Relationship workshop

"Tender is a charity that runs Drama courses for students and adults to inform them about healthy relationships and abuse. Launched in 2003 they work in secondary and primary schools, specialist schools, youth centres, alternative provisions and community groups. They teach people how to recognise early signs of abuse and build essential emotional and communication skills. During our workshop we did many exercises to teach us about the different types of abuse and how they are dealt with. In my opinion the best exercise we did was the temperature line. In this exercise we placed words on a healthy to unhealthy scale and we then learned about context and how it can change the meaning of a word. For example the word 'kissing' can be healthy if surrounded by words like love, respect and consent however it can be unhealthy if surrounded by words such as shouting, swearing or disrespect. This can be applied in school in friendships by respecting each other's boundaries, listening to each other, being kind, having trust and respect and being honest with each other."

Overall the students had an insightful, enjoyable trip and hope to return soon.




Year 12 Visit Day to Wadham College, Universty of Oxford

On 20th March 2025, a small group of Year 12 prospective early entry applicants visited Wadham college, one of the constituent colleges of the University of Oxford.

The morning session started with an overview of the Oxford's tutorial system, its rich history and research facilities.

Students opted to attend one of two academic taster sessions in either the humanities or a STEM subject. The 90 minute





taster sessions, led by MSc students at Wadham, focused on Whales or Neuroscience - specifically translational research at the cell and circuit level, including Parkinson's.

In the afternoon students were treated to a tour of the college grounds in the sunshine and attended a personal statement workshop with Dr Munro.
